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1. Introduction

1.1 Back ground and context

The Childcare Act 2006 ('the 2006 Act') fulfils the government's commitment to give every child the best start in life and parents greater choice about how to balance work and family life. The Act places duties on English local authorities to improve outcomes for young children and reduce inequalities between them; to secure sufficient childcare to enable parents to work; and to provide information to parents about childcare and a wide range of other services that may be of benefit to them.

The 2006 Act expands and clarifies in legislation the vital role that the Local Authority (LA) should play as strategic leaders in facilitating the childcare market, which was laid out in the Children Act 2004. The LA has the responsibility and lead role in co-ordinating effort across services, enabling different organisations, such as SureStart Children's Centres, extended schools, childcare providers from all sectors, JobCentre Plus and local health services, to work together to secure sufficient high quality, sustainable, provision that is responsive to the needs of children and their families. A key part of achieving this vision is to listen to the views and experiences of parents and children, maintaining a user focus and breaking down barriers which get in the way.

Section 6 of the 2006 Act sets out the duties placed upon the Local Authority (LA) to secure, so far as is reasonably practicable, that the provision of childcare is sufficient to meet the requirements of parents in their area.

This Childcare Sufficiency Review has been developed as a result of the evaluation of the LA Childcare Sufficiency Assessment (CSA) carried out during 2007 and also as part of the LA statutory responsibility to ensure that there is sufficient childcare to meet the needs of parents within County Durham.

1.2 Aims and Objectives

The aim of SureStart County Durham's Childcare Sufficiency Review is to ensure that sufficient sustainable, high quality, affordable and accessible childcare is available to meet the requirements of parents.

Sufficient childcare as defined in Section 6 of the 2006 Act, as being sufficient to meet the requirements of parents in County Durham who require childcare in order to enable them:-

- To take up work, or remain in, work or;
- To undertake education or training which could reasonably be expected to assist them to obtain work.

In determining whether provision of childcare is sufficient, the local authority must have regard to the needs of parents in their area for:-

- The provision of childcare in respect of which the childcare element of the working tax credit is payable, and;
- May have regard to any childcare which they expect to be available outside their area;
- Childcare is suitable for disabled children.

SureStart County Durham carried out the initial CSA during 2007.

'disabled child' means a child who has a disability for the purposes of the Disability Discrimination Act 1995

2. Childcare Sufficiency

2.1 Supply of Childcare

The number of children aged between 0 -14 years with in County Durham has risen by approximately 2.5% since 2007, from an estimated 78,895 in 2007 to an estimated 81,187 in 2008, with the largest proportion of children living in Durham and Chester-le-street. The largest number of children being in the 8 -14 years age group.

Across the County there has been a 17% reduction in the number of childcare settings, this equates to a 23% reduction in the total number of childcare places available to parents across the County.

Across the County there has been an increase of 254 children aged between 0-2years born during 2008. County Durham is taking part in the Two Year Old Pilot which is being very clearly targeted at areas of most deprivation with the Common Assessment Framework playing an intrinsic role in allocating places. Through the Two Year Pilot an additional 500 places for children aged 0 -2yedr will be made available. With in the CSA (2007) 79% of parents with children aged 0-2 years said that they did not want to use childcare or that they preferred to use informal childcare such as family or friends.

Table 2 below indicates that within County Durham there is a short fall of 271 childcare places for children aged 0 -2years. However, 192 new childcare places will be made available through Children's Centre developments. Of these places 36 places will be available for children aged 0 -2years.

In total that collated data on 3,337 children living in 1,828 households, of which there were 606 children aged between 0 and 35 months. Q3 of the survey asked the household if they rely on childcare in a typical week, and if so what type. Of the 606 children aged 35 months and under 483 (79.70%) stated they did not require registered Childcare (Other family members/relatives - 51, Friends/neighbours - 7, Do not use childcare - 425).

2.2 Demand for Childcare

The CSA (2007) highlighted that there exists within County Durham a reliance upon informal childcare with 35% of parents using family members as providers of childcare rather than other forms of registered childcare. The use of informal childcare will impact upon both the supply and demand for formal childcare. A priority for County Durham during 2009 will be to ascertain the reasons for this as far as is reasonably practicable.

2.3. Future use of Childcare

Parents were asked how many children aged 17 years and younger they expected to be using childcare in the next 2 years. Two thirds (65%) of parents said they do not expect to have any children using childcare in the next two years. Of those expecting to have children in childcare in the next two years the largest proportion (22%) expect to have one child in childcare, while 7% expect to have two children and only 2% expect to have three or more children in childcare. This means that 35% of parents will have or may have at least one child in childcare in the next 2 years, which indicates a possible increase in future childcare uptake when compared to the 28% of parents who say they currently use childcare.

Of the children expected to be using childcare in the next 2 years the largest proportion will be cared for by a family member (30%), while 27% will use a day nursery. A further quarter (13%) of children will be using a childminder and a similar proportion will be attending out of school care (12%) or a play group (11%). Only 2% of parents said they will be using early year's education which is probably an inaccurate picture of future use, and once again based on parents misunderstanding of what is meant by early year's education.

Of those parents expecting to have a child in childcare in the next two years, 91% said they will not have a child with a disability or additional need requiring childcare, while 2% said they didn't know if their child would require childcare. The remaining 7% do expect to have at least one child with a disability or additional need requiring childcare in the next two years.

2.4. Mapping Demand and use of childcare

Currently (March 09) there are over 2,978 full daycare places available, in addition 9399 places providing the flexible free entitlement – 12,377 in total. The CSA (2007) report revealed that only 28% of parents say they currently use childcare.

*** The total number of OS places required as identified in the above table reflect potential demand i.e. based on population of school aged children. Currently out of school provision for 5-14 year olds is being met through the extended services agenda and is based upon evidenced demand.**

The figures shown relating to demand were calculated using the following method:

1. Population estimates grouped by age ranges and split by Locality were obtained from DCC CR&I Team
2. The grouping for 0-2 and 3-4 were used against Full Daycare and Childminder.
3. It was established from the CSA survey of 1,828 households that of the 1,018 children aged 0-4 that 79.9% used Full Daycare and 21.1% used Childminders
4. The total population was split by these proportions for each Locality
5. From the CSA, section 4.2.1 it was identified that 28% of parents use Childcare for at least one of there children, therefore the proportioned population estimate were reduced to this percentage to indicate demand.

From the table above it would appear that overall there is a short fall of 1,625 full daycare places County wide. However, taking into account the available full daycare places which could be offered by childminders (should parents which to utilise full daycare through Childminders) this would result in a deficit of 785 full daycare places. In addition 192 new childcare places will be developed through Children's Centre developments.

2.4. Childcare & Extended Services in and through Schools.

As stated above, out of school provision including childcare for 5-14 year olds is being met through the extended services agenda and is based upon evidenced demand. With in County Durham 64% of all schools are providing access to the full core offer of extended services, including childcare. Whilst children aged 5-14 years may not require access to formal registered childcare as determined by OFSTED, the provision of childcare for older children is met through access to a varied menu of activities at or through schools. 88% of all schools with in County Durham are providing access to a varied menu of activities.

3. Sustainable Childcare

3.1 Creating Sustainable Childcare

Creating reliable and sustainable childcare is a key aspect of enabling parents to make real choices in balancing work and family life. To Facilitate the creation of

sustainable childcare with in County Durham, SureStart County Durham aims to ensure that all childcare business operate in a sustainable way by way of:

- Providing business support to childcare providers which includes advice and guidance around business planning, the development of a marketing strategy etc;
- Providing financial support to facilitate the long term sustainability of existing childcare providers in area where market failure will lead to closure in areas of greatest need, particularly in Children's Centres;
- One off financial support in areas where there is unmet demand.
- SureStart County Durham will work with Business Enterprise North East (BENE) as part of the Business Support Simplification Programme.

3.2 Assessing Sustainability of Childcare

SureStart County Durham has not previously proactively assessed the sustainability of childcare businesses (other than Children's Centres), this has been carried out on a needs only basis. However, in view of the current economic climate SureStart County Durham will work with BENE to undertake routine business health checks with all providers.

3.3 Supporting the Sustainability of Childcare

In line with SureStart County Durham's Childcare Sustainability Strategy, any business which is experiencing sustainability problems will be supported by way of:

- Short term sustainability funding;
- assessment of financial statements;
- Review of business plans;
- Development of marketing strategy;

SureStart County Durham undertakes regular monitoring of expenditure against sustainability funding allocated to settings.

4. Flexible Free Entitlement

Section 7 of the 2006 Act places a duty on the LA to secure a prescribed amount of early year provision free of charge for children of a prescribed age living with in the County. Regulations made under section 7 are expected to provide that:
The free entitlement must be made available for all three and four year olds; and
The minimum free entitlement that the LA must provide for eligible child is 12.5 hours per week for 38 weeks of the year rising to 15 hours per week for 38 weeks a year by 2010. Durham is a pathfinder authority & has offered 15hours since September 2008.

In January 2009 a total of 6,827 children were accessing 15 hours of the Flexible Free Entitlement.

In County Durham the key driver influencing the take up of Flexible Free Entitlement is the levels of deprivation. Over 50% of the County lies in the 20% most disadvantaged SOAs and within the context of children's centre services parents are encouraged to not only take part in their children's learning and development, but also to take up their free entitlement, often supplemented with wraparound care.

6 Review of Priorities for County Durham

In light of the 2008 evaluation of the CSA report the following priorities have been identified for 2009.

- To develop an action plan taking into the account the CSA annual review process prior to the undertaking the three year full CSA.
- To refine the data collection system to enable a more accurate assessment of the supply and demand of childcare.
- To consult with children to determine satisfaction of childcare by linking into One Voices Network and Investing in Children forum.
- To ensure that there is appropriate childcare to meet the needs of parents in those areas identified within the CSA Review.
- To continually monitor and review the CSA action plan.
